shape with fold tabs and room for the page to surprise you. Reach for it before making a pocket, when you
want to test the opening on scrap paper and keep a useful scrap close.PRINTPrint at 100% scale on A4
paper.USECut the outside line. Score the fold lines before turning the tabs inward. Keep the opening edge

three-panel foldout template for mapping what stays still, what opens, and where the page gets interesting.
Keep it beside the scraps while you plan the turn, before collage or adhesive makes the decision for
you.PRINTPrint at 100% scale on A4 paper. Check that the two hinge lines stay visible after
printing.USEScore the two hinge lines lightly before testing the opening. Plan the movement first, then add

while a page takes shape, whether you are building a simple or layered assembly.PRINTPrint at 100% scale
on A4 paper. Keep the page flat so the reference lines stay honest.USEUse the solid line for cuts and the
dashed line for scores or folds. Measure twice, test the opening with scrap paper, and glue only after the
